RULES (about Passes)

PLEASE READ

1. Exhibitors WILL NOT receive passes this year since exhibits will be picked up only on Sunday, September 21 from 2:00 to 4:00 PM.
2. Livestock Exhibitors will be furnished one (1) Pass for person looking after and feeding livestock. Trucks or cars will be entered at Barn Gate for purposes of unloading feed only. As soon as feed is unloaded, vehicles must be parked behind barn and not left in driveways. This pass admits ONE PERSON ONLY.

These rules are necessary and all profits from our Fair go to improve the grounds and for charitable purposes. We hope all people will cooperate and observe the above rules.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

NO PETS - ANIMALS ALLOWED

1. Competition is open to all Davidson County. The fair will open Monday afternoon at 4:00 pm, September 15.
2. Every reasonable effort will be made by members of the Fair Association and those in charge of the grounds to protect property on exhibition from loss or damage, but the Association will not hold itself responsible should loss or damage occur.
3. **NO ARTICLES ON EXHIBIT CAN BE REMOVED TEMPORARILY OR PERMANENTLY UNTIL SUNDAY AFTERNOON, SEPTEMBER 21, 2025 between 2:00 and 4:00 P.M., EXCEPT LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY.**
4. Premiums will be paid between **2:00 and 4:00 P.M.** on Sunday, September 21, 2025. Horse & Beef premiums will be available Tuesday, September 23, 2025 at Walter Fulp's office, 218 West Center St. Lexington; phone: 336.249.7531. All Premium money will be forfeited after October 23, 2025 (See inside of back cover for more details).
5. ALL ENTRIES AND EXHIBITS, EXCEPT LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY, TO BE PLACED ON SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 2025 BETWEEN 2:00 P.M. AND 5:00 P.M. (NOTE TIME)
6. The same article or animal cannot compete for the premium of two or more premium numbers of the department in which it is exhibited, except 4-H - F.F.A. livestock and shall not be awarded more than one premium under the same number unless stated by the catalogue.

The Fair management reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard there to or otherwise arising out of them.

JUDGING (EXHIBIT HALL ENTRIES)

PLEASE READ

1. Judging will be on Monday, September 15, by competent judges. No exhibitors will be allowed to accompany judges while exhibits are being judged.
2. Each department will be under special charge of its Director and only items listed in the Davidson County Fair Premium Book will be allowed to be entered for competition.
3. No entry will receive a prize unless it merits a prize.
4. Products or exhibits, except in livestock department, that were exhibited at any previous Davidson County Fair will not be accepted.

County fairs use one of two or a combination of the two judging systems.
See category to determine which judging system will be used in each department.

American System - Exhibits in this system are compared against a standard of perfection, as well as against the other entries in the class. All exhibits in a particular class are looked at and ranked with only one selected for first place, second place, third place, etc. If there are no high-quality exhibits, at the judge's discretion, exhibits may be placed in the appropriate position, even if it is second or third place. Judging will be influenced by the quality, condition, defects and uniformity of the exhibit.

Danish System - In this system, all exhibitors receive a ribbon. All exhibits are grouped according to quality, and there may be multiple entries that get the same ranking and ribbon. Quality may vary from excellent to fair, and ribbon categories may be blue, red, white, yellow, and/or green. In this system of judging, exhibits are not in competition with or compared to each other.

Always remember that Judges are looking for the following:

- Quality** – Color, marketability, maturity
- Condition** – Freshness, cleanliness, presentation, appearance.
- Defects** – Free From: damage, disease, other injury, insect damage etc.
- Uniformity** – Size, shape, color, maturity (multiple item entries (2 or more) uniformity of size, shape and color are key to doing well)

1. In order to award premiums on a quality basis, all containers except canned fruits and vegetables will be opened. Any canned fruit or vegetable that resembles a commercial product may be opened for testing.
2. EXHIBITS WILL BE RULED OUT WHEN NOT IN STANDARD CANNING JARS OF THE SPECIFIED SIZE. Please include the ring with two-piece lid jars.
3. Unless an article is of good quality, no premiums will be awarded.
4. **All products must be processed according to recognized safe methods found in the current editions of the USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning, So Easy to Preserve, NCHFP - National Center for Home Food Preservation Website.**
5. All jars, except dried fruits and vegetables, must be labeled as to content, processing method (pressure canner or boiling water bath) and processing time. ENTRIES WILL BE DISQUALIFIED IF NOT LABELED.
6. **An accurate recipe with processing information must be submitted with each entry. If the recipe and processing information are not included, the entry will be disqualified. Recipes become property of the fair and may be published. Put recipe in a small ziploc plastic bag and tape to top of jar. Include exhibitor ticket number on the recipe.**

4. Place the unwrapped entry in a large, clear food grade plastic bag (plastic wrap is not acceptable), with the entry tag extending outside the bag. **You must supply your own plastic bag. None will be available at the Fair entry office.**
5. Only 1/2 loaf of yeast bread or quick bread may be entered.
6. Place breads on a heavy paper plate or piece of heavy cardboard. They should be in clear food grade plastic bags (plastic wrap is not acceptable), with an attached entry tag extending outside the bag.
7. Place cookies and candies on heavy paper plates. Do not use cardboard. Put the plate into a clear food grade plastic bag (plastic wrap is not acceptable). Attach entry tag to the plate.
8. An accurate recipe must be submitted with each entry. If the recipe is not included, the entry will be disqualified. Recipes become the property of the Fair and may be published. Put the recipe in a small zip lock plastic bag and tape it to the bottom of the cardboard or plate. Include exhibitor ticket number on the recipe.
9. No more than ten entries from any individual will be accepted in this Class.
10. The same product may not be shared for entry by more than one individual. Violators (all individuals) will be disqualified.
11. All entries must be made from scratch (except decorated cakes & tricks with a mix), (K80-K88) Category.

GENERAL RULES

1. Classes are open to amateur flower growers any age.
2. Entry tags may be obtained in advance at the Davidson County Extension Office, 301 E Center Street, Lexington, NC and on September 14th at the Fairground Exhibit Hall. They can be completed in advance or on the day of entry with committee member assistance.
3. Judging will be conducted by panels of NGC approved judges.
4. Coffee will be served for the judges and Floriculture Volunteers at 8:30a.m., Monday, Sept. 15, 2025. Judging will begin promptly at 9:00a.m.
5. The sponsoring officials will exercise due caution, but cannot be held responsible for damaged or lost property. For identification purposes, a strip of adhesive with exhibitor's name and address should be applied inconspicuously to each container, base, flower pot, etc.
6. Premium checks must be picked up on Sunday, September 21, at the Fairgrounds between 2:00-4:00 p.m. or afterwards at Walter Fulp, CPA, 218 W. Center before October 23, 2025.
7. A cash award of appreciation will be paid to the sponsoring Garden Club.
8. The committee reserves the right to remove any wilted or unsightly specimen or design from the show.
9. Exhibits will be watered regularly by attendants.
10. The classification committee will check for conformity to schedule and reserves the right to place exhibits in proper classes if incorrectly entered.
11. Any entries which do not follow the schedule will be refused or displayed separately, but not judged.
12. This flower show conforms to the standards established by NGC. The Handbook for Flower Shows 2017 Edition with revisions printed in The National Gardeners Magazine is the authority for all issues not covered by the schedule, which is the law of the show. The NGC exhibit policies are printed in Chapter 6, Exhibiting in the Horticulture Division.
13. There is to be an emphasis on FRESH plant material. No artificial plant material in ANY Division.
14. No material on the North Carolina Conservation List (www.ncag.gov) may be used.
15. Exhibitors must pick up all horticulture and design entries between 2:00-4:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 21.

AWARDS

National Garden Clubs, Inc. Standard System of Awarding will be used for all competitive judging as specified in the Handbook for Flower Shows, Revised 2017. One blue (scoring 90 or above), one red (scoring 85 or above), and one yellow (scoring 80 or above) ribbon will be awarded in each class or subclass, if merited. White ribbons (scoring 75 or above) may be awarded and premiums added at the discretion of the Fair committee. The General, Design and Classification Chairpersons will be present during judging for possible consultation. They, along with the judges and clerks, are the only personnel allowed on the floor during judging. One Award of Merit (a Section Top Exhibitor Award) will be offered to the highest-scoring (95 or above) exhibit in each of Section B-E. One **Grower's Choice Award** (a Section Top Exhibitor Award) will be offered to the highest-scoring (95 or above) exhibit in Section A. All Section Top Exhibitor Award winners as well as the highest-scoring (95 or above) blue ribbon exhibit in each of Sections F-G will be eligible for the NGC Division Award of Horticulture Excellence. (See Handbook for Flower Shows 2017 edition pages 40-45 for further information) The judges' decisions will be final.

HORTICULTURE RULES

Specimen - one stem or stalk with attached foliage and blooms

Spray - group of florets on a single branched stalk

Stalk - stiff stem or axis of plant, may include branches

Stem - support plant structure to which buds, leaves, and flowers are attached

1. Classes in which there are sufficient entries may be subdivided according to type, cultivar, and/or color if the committee sees fit, and if budget for premiums is not exceeded by doing so.
2. All horticulture entries **MUST HAVE BEEN GROWN BY EXHIBITOR**. Container-grown plants must have been in exhibitor's possession at least 90 days, except combination plantings must have been in exhibitor's possession at least 6 weeks (42 days) and Section F for 6 months.
3. **ONE ENTRY PER PERSON FOR EACH CLASS**. Multiple entries are allowed **ONLY** in classes with an asterisk beside them (Class L-19*, for example). Each entry in these classes must be a different species. The fair reserves the right to withhold any premiums won in any class by an exhibitor breaking this rule.
4. Cut specimens exhibitors **must** furnish their own containers filled with water which allow for the visibility of the contents (See-thru Coke and similar bottles are allowed). The size of the container should be appropriate for the size of the specimen. Wedging is permitted in the neck of the container to steady the specimen and improve its pose. The committee reserves the right to refuse any entry not in the proper container and ready to enter!
5. No cut specimen over 30 inches tall will be accepted.
6. Cut specimens must be outdoor grown.
7. An entry **must** be labeled with the correct binomial name (Genus species) or its currently accepted scientific identification to be eligible for Top Exhibitor Awards.
8. Cut specimens and container grown plants must be entered and placed on Sunday, September 14th between **2:00 and 5:00 p.m.** Exhibits must be removed from **2:00 - 4:00 p.m.** Sunday, September 21.
9. If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be entered as a flowering plant. Foliage plants may flower, but should be exhibited as foliage plants if grown for their leaves.
10. Specimens with a class designation may not be entered in the "Any Other" class.
11. Please see Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017 edition, page 129 for Scale of Points.

PREPARATION OF HORTICULTURE SPECIMENS

Cut stems in late afternoon or early morning with a sharp knife or clippers on a slant for greatest intake of moisture. Re-cut and place specimens in tepid tap water and place the vessel in a cool, dark place free of drafts. This is termed "conditioning" your specimens. It improves substance and holds freshness. Select only clean, clear bottles to display your specimens and transport them carefully to the flower show.

Botanical Names. Type in the common name you know in your search engine. It will almost always give you the botanical name. It consists of two terms denoting *Genus* and *species*, in that order. If the plant is a hybrid, the cultivar name is added. If the plant occurs in nature it is a variety. When handwritten it should appear as Genus species 'Cultivar' or var. variety. (i.e. French Marigold 'Lemon Drop' would be Tagetes patula 'Lemon Drop') We will assist you with this at registration as needed.

Grooming of horticulture specimens is permitted. Remove damaged leaves. No wire, oil, spray or artificial color is permitted in horticulture classes. Evidence of spray, residue, dust, or insect damage must be carefully removed from specimen.

Container grown plants should be well groomed with no seedpods, no wilted flowers, no damaged or unclean foliage, no broken stems and no "training" props visible. The container should be clean and in scale with the size of the plant.

Accessory foliage is never used with specimens. Only foliage naturally grown on specimen and still attached is permitted.

HELPFUL HINTS: Use only see-thru containers/bottles so the stems will be visible. Wash them so the water will be clear. Use small-necked bottles to help steady the specimen. If the neck is too large to hold the specimen upright, you may wedge a small wad of paper towel, plastic wrap or styrofoam in the neck beside the specimen—This is called 'Wedging'. Foliage is not permitted below water level (exception: Gladiolus).

COMBINATION PLANTINGS

- Class L-22 Combination Planting, more than one species of the same genus or more than one cultivar of the same species planted in one pot (i.e., all *Begonias*, all *Impatiens*, all *Coleus*)
- Class L-23* Miniature Landscapes. May contain accessories.
 - A: A dish garden in an open container (i.e. 'Fairy Garden')
 - B: A terrarium in an enclosed transparent container.
- Class L-24 Planter, 10" diameter or over, 3 or more different types of plants artfully combined in a single container. (No accessories allowed)
- Class L-25 Planter, under 10" diameter, 3 or more different types of plants artfully combined in a single container. (No accessories allowed)
- Class L-26 Strawberry pot or tiered pots containing any kind of plants

CACTI AND OTHER SUCCULENTS

CACTI - Succulents having areoles from which spines, branches, and/or flowers arise.

SUCCULENTS - Plants that store water in their stems, leaves or both.

All cacti are succulents; all succulents are not cacti.

- Class L-131 Ornamental Grasses, flower or seed head, 1 specimen (i.e., *Miscanthus*, *Pennisetum*, *Muhlenbergia*, *Chasmanthium*)
- Class L-132 Perennials, 1 stem each of 3 different species in one container
- Class L-133* Any unlisted cut flowering perennial, single specimen 12" or less in length
- Class L-134* Any unlisted cut flowering perennial, single specimen over 12" in length
- Class L-135* Any unlisted cut foliage perennial-i.e., *Hosta*, *Fatsia*, *Polygonatum* (Solomon's Seal)

SECTION C - CUT SPECIMENS ANNUALS & BIENNIALS (OUTDOOR GROWN)

Eligible for *Award of Merit*

ANNUAL - A plant which starts from a seed each year and develops flowers and seeds in one season.

BIENNIAL - A plant which typically starts from a seed and produces vegetative structures and food storage roots the first season, then develops flowers, fruits and seeds the second season.

- Class L-81 *Celosia argentea cristata*, Cockscomb, crested, any color, one stem
- Class L-82 *Celosia argentea plumosa*, Cockscomb, plumed or feathered, any color
- Class L-83 *Cosmos*, 3 stems, any color
- Class L-84 *Impatiens*, single stalk, single or double
- Class L-86 *Solenostemon*, Coleus, 1 stem
- Class L-87 *Salvia*, any annual type, 5 stems of the same cultivar
- Class L-88 *Tagetes*, Marigold, (2-4" diameter) same cultivar, 3 stems
- Class L-89 *Tagetes*, Marigold, dwarf (under 2" diameter), one stem containing 3 or more blooms (spray)
- Class L-90 *Tagetes*, Marigold, 3 different cultivars in one container
- Class L-91 *Vinca*, single stalk
- Class L-92 *Zinnia*, 3" and over diameter, single specimen
- Class L-93 *Zinnia*, dwarf (under 3" diameter), 3 stems, any kind or color
- Class L-94 *Zinnia*, bi-colored or variegated, single specimen
- Class L-95 Annuals, one stem each of 3 different species in one container
- Class L-96* Any unlisted cut flowering annual or biennial, single specimen 12" long or less. (NO herbs)
- Class L-97* Any unlisted cut flowering annual or biennial, single specimen over 12" long. (NO herbs)
- Class L-98* Any unlisted cut foliage annual or biennial, single specimen (NO herbs)
- Class L-99* Any unlisted cut fruited or berried annual or biennial, single specimen i.e., *Capsicum annuum* (Ornamental Pepper) (NO herbs)
- Class L-100 Any annual vine (i.e. *Bougainvillea*, *Mandevilla*)

SECTION D - CUT SPECIMENS PERENNIALS / TENDER PERENNIALS (OUTDOOR GROWN YEAR ROUND)

Eligible for *Award of Merit*

PERENNIAL-(Zones 1-7) A plant which lives for 3 or more years and, after reaching maturity, typically produces flowers and seeds each year. A dormant perennial emerges from roots or from old stems, not from seed.

TENDER PERENNIAL-(Zones 8-10) Plant which is hardy in warmer regions, but may occasionally live in this area (Zone 7)

- Class L-121 *Aster*, any type, single specimen or spray, not over 24"

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE

Entries close Friday, September 12, 2025. See Carl McKnight, DeLane Ward (Dairy)

**IN THE EVENT THE FAIR HAS TO CLOSE BECAUSE OF WEATHER,
ANY SCHEDULED LIVESTOCK SHOWS WILL BE CANCELED.**

1. All animals entered in Fair must originate from certified Brucellosis-Free Herd and a herd not under quarantine in a certified Brucellosis-Free certified area, or have passed a negative official blood test for Brucellosis within 60 days of admission to the Fair; except that cattle under eight (8) months of age and officially Brucellosis Vaccinated heifers under twenty (20) months of age need not be tested.
2. All cattle entered in Fair must originate in an accredited tuberculosis-free herd which has been tuberculin tested within the past twelve (12) months, or originate from a herd not under quarantine and has been tuberculin tested with negative results within 60 days of admission to the Fair.
3. Cattle herds meeting the above regulations may be shown with statement from their local veterinarian giving them a herd certification.
4. Dairy Cattle will remain at fairgrounds for a minimum of three (3) days according to the following schedule:
If entered by 6:00 p.m. on Monday, September 15, may leave after 10:00 p.m. on Wednesday, September 17. Dairy Cattle Judging will begin Tuesday night, September 16 at 5:00 p.m. Junior Fitting and Showing will be first. Dairy animals must be removed by 3:00 a.m. September 17.
5. Beef Cattle will be placed between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., Thursday, September 19. Beef Cattle may be picked up at the grounds after the show on Saturday, September 20.
6. Dairy Cattle Exhibitors, upon departure, must clean up the area where they tied their cattle. If you fail to do so, the Fair management reserves the right to withhold premiums.
7. Sick animals must be removed as soon as noticed.
8. Papers must be available to verify age of animals on request of director.
9. Directors will assign the stall space.
10. For each 5 dairy animals entered in fair, the producer will be allowed to bring one of the five animals just prior to show and take it home immediately after the show.
11. Be courteous to other exhibitors when loading cattle.

HERDSMAN AWARDS DEPARTMENTS M, N, and O

Open to all exhibitors who show 3 or more animals. This award is offered to show appreciation to the personnel for presenting their animals in an attractive manner. There are no other class of exhibits that require more attention to neatness, cleanliness and sanitation as does the exhibit of livestock.

PRODUCE-OF-DAM: To consist of two (2) animals, any age, either sex, the product of one cow. Dam must be named, either exhibitor is limited to one entry from the same Dam.

BEST UDDER: The judge will select a first and second place animal based on udder alone from each of the following milking classes. All cows in the class will be considered and no entry is needed. - Health Regulations. All chickens and turkeys for exhibition in North Carolina shall originate from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks, or have a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days of date of exhibition.
- No birds will be cooped until they meet above health requirements. The management of the Davidson County Fair will have a representative of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture to blood-test birds from the hours of 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. Monday, September 15, 2025. After passing health test, birds may be cooped.
- No one will be allowed to handle fowls on display except owners or officials of the show without permission from the directors.
- Exhibits must be removed on **Saturday from 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.** Unless other arrangements are made, any remaining exhibits' premiums will be forfeited.
- The feed for the poultry show will be furnished.
- Entries may be made in the Poultry Department consisting of:
